Day 4 Carpet Game


Practice number recognition with a fun carpet game. Teach the ASL sign for moon.

Hey, Diddle, Diddle Nursery Rhyme




A nursery rhyme is a traditional rhyming poem or song. Teaching nursery rhymes helps young children to develop auditory skills and helps with speech development.

Objective:

The students will develop listening and speaking skills by reciting a poem.

Activities:

- 1. Read the poem to the students and invite the children to join you in reading it again. Point to each of the characters as you read.
- 2. Act out the nursery rhyme by assigning the role play name tags to each child. Use props to act out the poem as the rest of the class recites it.







Hey, Diddle, Diddle Listening Practice & Position Words

Practicing active listening develops communication and problem-solving skills.

Incorporate these with a fun movement activity.

Objective:

The students will develop listening skills by listening with increasing attention to directions.

Activities:

- Copy a moon picture for each child. Either print them with colored ink, or print the B4W copies onto colored paper.
- 2. Students place their moon on the ground. Recite the poem as students perform the action on the card.

Extension Idea:

Create retelling character sticks.

Print a page of characters for each student. Have students color their characters and out them out. Cut out the pictures for the younger students. Attach the pictures to craft sticks. Recite the rhume as students use their puppets to retell the story.

Hey, Diddle, Diddle



Rhyming is an essential skill for young children. Rhyming helps children improve their oral language ability and is a building block for young readers.

Objective:


The students will identify rhyming words.

Activity:

1. Identify each picture with the students, then give a card to each child. Students will decide if it rhymes with cat, dog, dish or spoon and place it under the correct heading card. For younger children, start with 2 heading cards.

Extension Idea:

The fiddle is a musical instrument. Students can make their own instrument! A box with an elastic band makes a great noise. Tupperware boxes with dry beans can make a drum. Straws taped together could make a harmonica. Ask the students what ideas they have to make their own instrument.

Day 4 lesson plans

Math skills are the foundation for logic and critical thinking. Number sense is the first step in math awareness.

Objective:

• The students will identify numbers.

Activity:

1. Play the Hey Diddle, Diddle number identification game.

To Play the Game:


• Line up the pictures of the cows. (Pick the right number of cards for your students.) Identify the numbers together.

 Hide the moon under one of the cows and recite the poem to find it.

 Children guess where the moon is hiding by identifying the number.

Extension Idea:

Teach the ASL sign for **moon**. Make your thumb and index finger into a C- shape, while keeping your other fingers curled. Move the C shape from your eye and move it up and away from your body.

Objective:


• The students will count and recognize numbers.


Activity:

- 2. Students will count and choose the correct number.































Take-Home Mini Book
