A nursery rhyme is a traditional rhyming poem or song. Teaching nursery rhymes helps young children to develop auditory skills and helps with speech development.

Objective:

- The students will develop listening and speaking skills by reciting a poem.

Activities:

- Recite the poem to the students and invite the children to join you in reading it again.
- Reenact the poem with props. Use small blocks to build a wall and a plastic Easter egg (draw a face on it for fun!) for Humpty. As the class recites the poem, the students can take turns putting Humpty on the wall and then knocking him off with their hands.

Rhyming

Rhyming is an essential skill for young children. Rhyming helps children improve their oral language ability and is a building block for young readers.

Objective:

- The students will play with words, sounds, and rhymes.

Activities:

- Print the rhyming egg puzzles, laminate and mat. Cut the puzzles apart on the middle line.
- Identify the pictures and the rhymes with the students.
- Pass out the top section of each of the eggs to the students. Hold up the bottom section with the matching rhyme. Jump up and complete!

Science Experiment

Hands-on scientific exploration with preschoolers helps children see naturally curious about the world around them and enhances communication and analytical thinking.

Objective:

- The students will explore cause and effect.

Activities:

- Make sure to check that students do not have egg allergies.
- Take a poll. "Will the egg break?" Use either real eggs, plastic eggs, or water balloons for this science experiment. Ask students to predict what will happen if the egg is dropped from a table, or if it lands on a blanket, etc.
- Recount students' predictions on a pocket chart before each experiment.

Domains:

The students will improve their motor skills and have strength. They'll develop language and math skills. Purchase laminated eggshells, blankets, silver laundry to protect students' clean clothes. Using their fine motor skills and strength learn for the place in the poem. Always check for latex allergies or use latex free materials.

Being able to manipulate sounds in words is an important literacy skill for young pre-readers.

Objective:

- The students identify beginning sounds of rhyming words.

Activities:

- Print the -all pages, laminate and cut out.
- Place the -all word cards in a pocket chart.
- Hold up a picture and ask students to say the word, listening to the beginning sound.



Objective: Students will count sets to 20 and identify numbers 0-20.


Preparation: Print the Tens Frame Puzzles and laminate or mat as desired. Cut the puzzles apart on the middle line.

Procedure: Students count the dots, then find the matching number to assemble the puzzle.





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- The students will play with words, sounds, and rhymes.

3. Pass out the top section of each of the eggs to the students. Hold up the bottom portion of the egg. The student with the matching rhyme jumps up and completes the egg.

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- The students identify beginning sounds and rhyming words.


Activities:

- Print the -all pages, laminate and cut out. Place the -all word cards in a pocket chart. Hold up a picture and ask students to say the word, listening to the beginning sound.
- Find the letter that matches the beginning sound and place it in front of the -all to make the word.
- Read the list of rhyming words.



Extension Idea:

Teach the ASL sign for **egg**. Form the letter H with your pointer fingers on both hands. Put your right hand "H" on top of your left hand "H" then swipe hands down as if to break the egg.






